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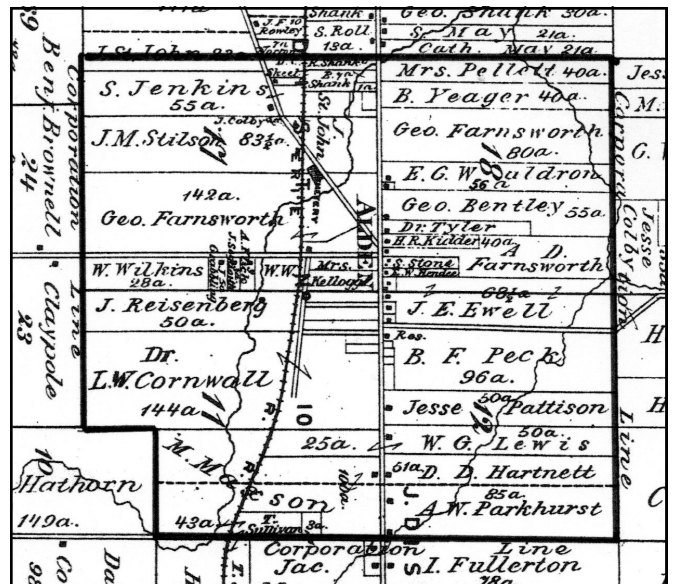

Happy Birthday, Village of Alden!

Yes, we are in a year-long celebration of the 150th birthday of the incorporated Village of Alden, with events scheduled for each month. The Village was incorporated by action of the New York State Legislature on May 7, 1869. Today's requirements for a village are a population of at least 500 and an area of not more than 5 square miles. According to the 2010 census, the population of the Village was 2,605 and the area was 2.718 square miles.

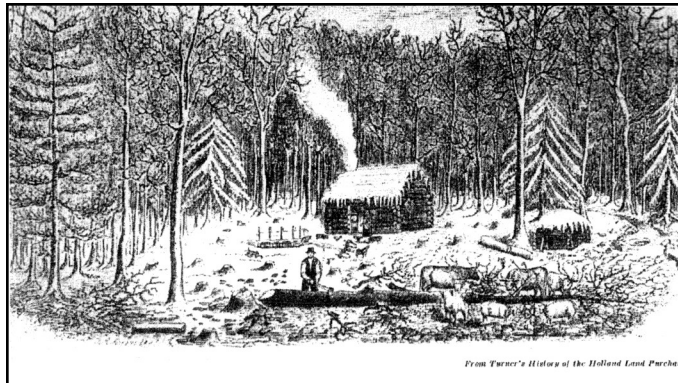
An interesting bit of folk lore surrounds the 1869 incorporation. It seems there were not quite enough citizens to sign the necessary petition. It is said that Dr. Levinus Cornwall went to the Village Cemetery and copied down names of "residents" there to make up the difference.

It could be said that the Village's birthday is really 1823 when Alden got a post office; before then, mail was picked up in Clarence, because Alden was then part of the large Town of Clarence. Or we could base our birthday on the year the first settler built a home and raised crops in what is now the Village. If so, we would be celebrating our 209th birthday!



It was in the fall of 1809 that Moses Fenno from Massachusetts purchased property in Lot 17 of Township 11, Range 5 of Joseph Ellicott's survey of the Holland Land Company purchase. The Corporation contains Lots 11, 12, 17 and 18 as seen on this 1880 map.

It is believed that Fenno's property was near the site of the Erie Railroad Depot and today's Whistle Stop Inn. Whether Fenno built a rough shelter that September or waited until the following spring we do not know. We do know that in the spring of 1810 he planted crops and started an orchard. He and his wife Sarah had four children: Rebecca, Joseph, Margaret and Susan. The oldest three were born in Vermont.

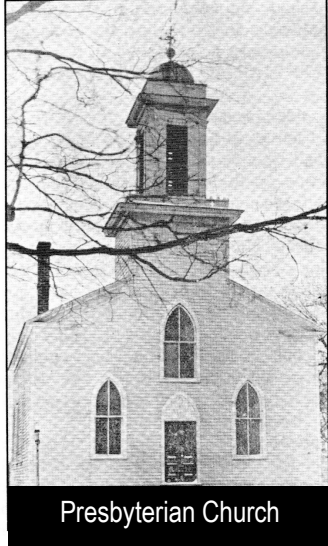

That summer, 1810, more settlers arrived, many from Lebanon, New Hampshire: Joseph Freeman and his father-in-law Nehemiah Estabrook and his two brothers-in-law John and Nehemiah, Jr., Silas Tiffany, James Crocker, Jr. and their families. In 1811 came Aaron Bunce, William Dayton, Arunah Hibbard, and Jonas Stickney.

The Hibbards had the honor of having the first child born in the village, Emily in 1812. The first death was that of Polly Kranske, half-sister of Moses Fenno, in the summer of 1813. Later that year Polly's father became very ill and asked Joseph Freeman to purchase property for a public cemetery. That was done and John Kranske was the first to be buried in what is now the Alden Evergreen Cemetery.



Presbyterian Church

The first church, Congregational (later Presbyterian), was organized in the home of Joseph Freeman on July 13, 1813. Nehemiah Estabrook was the first clerk. The first school in the village, a log cabin, was started in 1815 with Mehitable Estabrook, daughter of Nehemiah, as teacher.

The War of 1812 raged in nearby Buffalo and across Lake Erie in Ontario. Most of the men of the Village were called to fight. Family lore has it that old Nehemiah Estabrook, an American Revolution veteran, got out his sword, ground off the dust, and was determined to enlist again in defense of his country; he was finally dissuaded. Nehemiah, Jr. did fight and narrowly escaped being killed when the British were bombarding from Fort Erie. Arunah Hibbard was wounded in the Battle of Lundy's Lane in Canada. and Moses Fenno was killed in the Battle of Black Rock on December 30, 1813. That battle, along with the burning of Buffalo, alarmed the Alden settlers and many of them fled east, putting the Genesee River between themselves and the feared British soldiers. Most returned the following spring.

The small hamlet continued to grow. Amos Bliss opened the first tavern in 1815 at the eastern end of the village. In 1816, Seth Estabrook, nephew of Nehemiah, brought a load of goods and opened a store on Mercer Road—now Sullivan Road. It is Seth who suggested the name "Alden" for the hamlet.. When asked about the name he said it was short and sweet, just like his mother-in-law,

Hannah Alden Hebard. Hence, Alden got the nickname "Grannytown" for being named after an old lady.

In 1821, Thomas Farnsworth purchased land from Aaron Bunce, land that encompassed most of what is now the Village, and built the first frame house. He also began the first industry in Alden by building a tannery on Crittenden Road, along Spring Creek. The tannery was later built spanning Tannery Creek on Broadway where Rite Aid now stands.

The Town of Alden was created from the Town of Clarence by an act of the State Legislature on April 1, 1823. A post office was established in the village and Joseph Freeman was appointed the first postmaster, a position he held for eighteen years. Freeman was also a magistrate and Judge of Probate for Erie County for ten years.

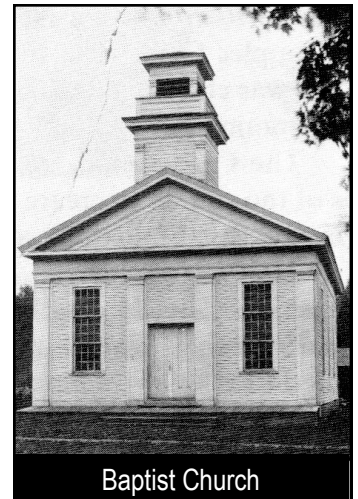
John Harrington, the first doctor for the village, arrived in 1825. Calvin Bishop opened the first store in the village in 1830. The Presbyterian Church erected its first building in 1833 on Church Street, the same year the Baptists organized a congregation. They dedicated their building (now the American Legion Hall) on December 22, 1852.

A boon to the village happened in 1843 when the Buffalo & Attica Railroad (later the Erie Railroad) was constructed in the southern part of the village. Now farmers could get their produce and milk to Buffalo more quickly and freight could come to the village.

The small log-cabin school had been replaced with a larger frame school when, in 1852, the Union Free School District was created. The taxes to support the school were paid by the parents of the pupils until 1867 when the property-based school tax was instituted. William Learned and other men interested in education built the Alden Seminary in 1854. It was a private high school supported by tuition. The building is still standing at 13104 Broadway.

Disaster struck in 1866 when all the businesses along the south side of Main Street (Broadway), from Exchange Street west, were destroyed by fire. There was no loss of life and the owners quickly rebuilt.

We are also trying to increase community involvement by inviting interested members of our community to assist our Trustees by volunteering as additional docents when the building is open on Sundays and special events. Curator's Corner



During the months of January and February, the collection committee emptied the storage closet behind the military room and inventoried the clothing there. Much of the clothing was mildewed so we did the inventory and set aside the damaged clothes. The empty closet was sprayed twice with Lysol to hopefully kill mildew spores and then vacuumed. The remaining clothes were returned to the closet with more space between them. A large bookcase was moved to the organization room and seven boxes of

Alden Village history booklets were moved into the military room under the civil war case.

On President's Day, Larry, Chris, and Conrad met with Karen and me. We moved displays and furniture to new locations. The old kitchen has become the organization room with matching cases on either side of the doorway. The Native American display cases are side by side in the Davis room and the round table from the kitchen is now in that room. One portable table now supports the computers and phone. Conrad hung paintings and signs in the Davis room which gives some much needed color to the room.

The former organization room is now the office for the historian and myself. The large bookcase holds all the binders that were in the barrister case previously. Very old and fragile ledgers from some Alden businesses are now on the top of that bookcase, safely away from excess moisture and light. I hung curtains on the two closet doors to allow for more airflow and the office "door" is another set of curtains. I made and hung curtains in the military room to hide the seven boxes of Village booklets.

In the parlor, the lady mannequin and her "daughter" are now dressed in summer clothes along with a baby doll. The hamlet display has been refreshed.

In summary, our building has been transformed and we hope that new visitors will come to enjoy our collection. Thank you to all who helped to achieve this change.

Please join us as we celebrate the Village of Alden’s 150th Anniversary. May 9, join us as we bury a time capsule in front of Village Hall, followed by dedication of the Historical Society’s Moses Fenno historical marker. Then return to village hall for birthday cake and ice cream! June 13 – Historical Society program Historic Route 20. June 15 – Black Water Day— join us on a bus tour of the historic sites of the black water baths. Alden is noted for its black water baths. Mineral rich "black water" was discovered while drilling for natural gas in 1891. During the drilling process, one of the few unsuccessful operations had struck a vein of mineral rich black water. Although it was a disappointment to the gas company, it became a boon to the community. In 1936 the New York State Joint Legislative Committee investigated mineral water state-wide. The committee concluded that "Alden Black Mineral Water is especially beneficial in the treatment of rheumatism, arthritis, sciatica, neuritis, salt rheum, high and low blood pressure and skin diseases." July 10, listen to Barbershop quartets in Bandstand Park. July 11 is Taste of Alden and 5K race. July 12 -13— join us for a carnival with rides, old fashioned carnival games, contests, bands, giant parade and fireworks. July 28 is the annual car show to benefit Mercy Flight. “First Settler” Historical Marker Dedication Ceremony Planned

Plans are underway by the Alden Historical Society and the Village of Alden Sesquicentennial Committee to hold a dedication ceremony for the placement of the Society’s third historical marker this decade. The “First Settler” marker is planned to be dedicated on the Village’s anniversary date, May 9th, at a location on Exchange Street believed to be in the vicinity of the first non-native settlement in what is now the Village of Alden. Moses Fenno of Massachusetts built a homestead and raised crops in the spring of 1810 at the site. Fenno, a member of the New York Militia, was later killed in action during the Battle of Black Rock in 1813. A reception at Village Hall is planned after the dedication ceremony. The marker joins the Town Line Secession & Reunion and Alden Presbyterian Church as markers placed by the Historical Society since 2013.

Larry Mruk, retired teacher and Explore Buffalo docent, shared his extensive knowledge of Buffalo's role in aviation history at the January 10 program. The "Buffalo Production Soldier," was Mruk's term for the Buffalo workers employed in the aviation industry during WW II. Out of a population of 576,000, Buffalo had over 300,000 people employed in the aviation industry or in support of it. Buffalo was the major supplier of WW II aircraft, producing over 29,000 planes for the war effort.
