# In The Good Ol' Summertime

For the past seventy-five years, Alden's children and youth have enjoyed a summer recreation program supported by the Town of Alden. Now in its seventy-sixth year, the Recreation Program had its beginning in the summer of 1947. Gerald Heitman, a North Tonawanda physical education teacher and former Alden resident, was hired as director. A full-time summer program was planned plus a part-time program for the rest of the year.

Most of the activities were held on what used to be Grange lands on West Main Street. The Town had purchased the property in 1940 for a Town Park. Over the years, the activities have changed as interests have changed, but there have always been sports, games and crafts. Perhaps the best way to describe those activities is to listen to the memories of children and teens who participated in the activities.

There were horseshoes, tennis, basketball, track, and golf tournaments/ leagues that seemed to run non-stop.

Softball play days and tournaments to neighboring towns were great. Catch the bus at the Park in the morning and be gone all day playing softball.

We played waffle ball between the refreshment stand and the tennis courts, using the tennis court fence as our homerun fence, and upsetting the tennis players.

They got empty ice cream tubs from Neelands and we covered them with felt to make small waste baskets.

Made really cool wire flowers dipped in some sort of liquid that left a clear, plastic, opaque film. Probably something really toxic in today's world.

Crafts for 25 cents, 10 cent plaster crafts in the barn-like building. (The old highway barn.)

Crystal Beach trips, trips to Green Lake and to Indian Falls Lake for swimming lessons and trips to the Erie County Fair.

Special Days like Pirate Day and Indian Day, the Penny Fair and the Doll Show.

Roller skating at the roller rink with clip-on skates and a skate key. Raising the windows with a wooden brace to keep them open. Roller skating to organ music and records.

One person said it best, "Our Rec Program growing up was amazing!"

Previous to the Town Recreation Department there had been a Recreation Committee organized by businessmen during World War II to provide recreation activities for Alden's youth. Various facilities were used throughout the town—a rifle range in St. John's shed directed by Dr. Raymond May; roller skating and dancing in the Town Park Pavilion, supervised by community organizations such as the Alden Mothers Club; and an ice rink on the east side of Crittenden Street, under the supervision of Rev. Gordon Neufang. The Committee also opened the "Swing-In" and Soda Bar for teens in Liberal Hall (American Legion Hall) on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday evenings during WWII.

The Alden Recreation Committee received national recognition for its war time recreation program for young people in the "Recreation Bulletin" published in Washington, D.C. and distributed throughout the nation. The write-up lauded the Town and Village Boards for their cooperation with the Recreation Committee and gave credit

to the parents and teens who helped make the program a success.



We wish the Alden Recreation Department another great program for Alden's children and youth in this good ol' summertime of 2023.

# Curator's Corner - Growing Up As a Tomboy- 50's and 60's

I was born in the fall of 1951 with two older sisters and one brother.

Despite the fact that I was dressed in ruffly dresses until about age 4, I was never a girly-girl. I had dolls and toy dishes that I occasionally played with, but I much pre-

ferred bikes, roller skates, cowboy clothes and play guns and more masculine activities. Because the school didn't allow girls to wear pants, I wore dresses to school and immediately changed to "dungarees" when I got home. My usual playmates were a boy cousin and a girl who was a few years older. She was a "tomboy" too. We spent hours riding stick horses through the neighborhood and climbing trees. My cousin and I explored the Slate Banks and came home with muddy sneakers and bags of fool's



gold. Rik got a paper route when he was about eleven and I wanted one too. The

newspaper man said that I couldn't have one because I was a **girl**. It was the same with Little League. Girls can't play baseball! I

intensely disliked the sexism of those years but I never wanted to be a boy. I accepted my role as a girl as I matured but at almost
72, I remain an outdoorsy woman with no regrets about it.

# Past Programs

#### Origin of the Electric Chair Presented April 13



1. Presented by Maria Blair, owner/operator of No Illusions Tours. Ms. Blair shared that the electric chair, intended to be a faster, more efficient and painless means of execution, was invented in Buffalo in the 1880's by Alfred P. Southwick, a dentist, inventor, and professor. The first offender sentenced to death, after conviction by the courts, was Buffalo resident William Kemmler, sentenced for a crime he committed in Buffalo where he was tried and convicted. The chair did not fulfill its intended goal of painless and efficient execution and has been removed from the methods of execution in most states where the death sentence is still an option.



#### **History of Exchange Street Depot May 11**



Held at the Exchange Street Railway Depot, Mark Casell presented the history of the depot, which he and his wife Diane own. The depot was constructed in 1868 for the Attica-Buffalo Railway line, which offered both freight and passenger service. The depot ceased operations in 1963, having ended passenger service in 1957. The sidings, previously located on the north and south sides of the depot have been removed as trains no longer stop for passengers and freight delivery or pick-up. Later owners were the Erie and Erie-Lackawanna lines. It is currently owned by the Norfolk-Southern Co.

#### **Historical Marker Presented June 8**



An historical marker was presented to the Alden Legion Post 1377, followed by a presentation by NYVFW Past State Commander Marlene Roll with rules about appropriate flag protocol. Alden Town and Village Historian Karen Muchow reviewed the history of the Legion Hall from its origin as a Baptist Church built in 1852, to its purchase in 1908 by the Alden Liberal Club, who hosted a variety of community activities. The Village of Alden purchased the building in 1924. The newly formed American Legion Post 1377 took posses-

sion in 1947, and is the current occupant. Roger Erny identified some renovation work that has been done and the current goal of renovating the kitchen. He thanked the community for their support and donations over the years and that donations for the current project would be greatly appreciated.

# Legion Hall Built in 1852 as the Alden Baptist Church, it served that congregation until 1894 when it finally closed. Purchased by the Liberal Club, a women's organization, in 1908 it became the social and cultural center for the community with dinners, dances, dramatic plays, lectures, graduations, and even basketball games. It was rented as a movie theater in the 1920's and 30's. In 1924, the Liberal Club sold the building to the Village of Alden for a Village Hall. The Village sold it for \$1 to the newly organized Legion Post 1377 in 1947. Alden Historical Society, 2022













