ACS Football

An article in the September 4, 1952 issue of the Alden Advertiser began thusly: "The 1952-53 school year introduces a new era in the football annals of Alden Central School. This year Alden is taking another step in bettering its athletic program by switching from Six-Man Football to the original game of Eleven-Man."

Six-man high school football had been developed in 1934 by Stephen Epier in Chester, NB as an alternative means for small, rural high schools to field a football team during the Great Depression. It was played on an 80 yard long by 40 yard wide field, although, according to the rule book, it could be played on a normal size eleven-man field. (100 yds by 53 1/3 yds). Instead of the usual 10 yards to gain a first down from the line of scrimmage, 15 yards had to be gained. In offense, three players had to be on the line of scrimmage. All six players were eligible receivers.

Scoring was the same as eleven- man football with the exceptions that a point after touchdown attempt with a kick was worth two points, a running or passing PAT was worth 1 point. Field goals were worth 4 points, instead of 3.

The change to eleven-man football meant that Alden would change from the Genesee Orleans County Six-Man League to the newly formed Oatka Football Conference comprised of teams from Livingston, Wyoming and Erie Counties. Alden's opponents would be Letchworth, Attica, Warsaw, Perry and Akron.



Curator's Corner - 208 Years of Alden Schools

Alden Intermediate School principal, John Mikulski, invited Kris Rogers, Alden Historical Society Curator, and Karen Muchow, Alden Town and Village Historian to present a program on the history of the Alden Central School District as one of the choices for the ACS staff on August 29. Historian Muchow traced the history from the very first school in 1815 (a log cabin) to the thirteen district schools in the township, to centralization, thru the building boom of the 1960s, and the various additions through the years. Photos of the various school buildings, and some classes of students from the Historian's files helped the attendees visualize the 200+ years.

The photo here is of the District #12 schoolhouse in Crittenden. It was one of three one-room red-brick schoolhouses in the Town. Do you know the locations of the other two?

Historic Hull Family Home Summer History Camp

The Alden Historical Society offered two scholarships to the Hull Family Home and Farmstead Summer History Camp. Two students from Alden Intermediate were selected: Savannah Cole and Haydin Erny. The students attended the camp where they learned about the history of the Hull family and participated in activities geared to resemble life on a farm in the early 1800's. The activities included performing household chores and working with vintage tools, textiles, and crafts. They played period games, participated in an archaeological dig, and assisted with cooking and food preparation. Additionally, they observed a presentation by Revolutionary War re-enactors as well as learning about Native American life, making cornhusk dolls and practicing the fundamentals of lacrosse.

Both Alden students enthusiastically reported that they very much enjoyed the camp and the activities. They were grateful for the opportunity to add to their knowledge of early settlers' lives by experiencing what their lives were like. The Society plans to continue offering two scholarships each summer. Information about applying for the scholarships will be made available in early 2024.

5th Grade Students Hosted





Some Exterior Maintenance at Heritage Center




