Happy New Year ~ One Hundred Years Ago...

In 1924, Calvin Coolidge, Babe Ruth, and George Gershwin were all on center stage. Baked ham and icebox cake were crowd-pleasers, and Charles and Dorothy were popular baby names. A Neutrodyne radio receiver cost \$100.00, a gallon of Benjamin Moore paint was \$2.49, and straw hats were \$2.25 apiece.

Calvin Coolidge (R-Massachusetts) was elected to a full term as president of the United States by defeating Democrat John W. Davis. On February 22, President Coolidge delivered the second radio address by a U.S. president from the White House in a coast-to-coast broadcast on 42 radio stations.

J. Edgar Hoover was appointed as the first director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI).

IBM was initially founded as the Computing, Tabulating & Recording Company (CTR). In 1924, CTR was renamed International Business Machines (IBM) by Thomas J. Watson.

The Ford Motor Company manufactured the 10 millionth Model T Ford.

The Canton Bulldogs were the NFL champs, the Montreal Canadians clinched the Stanley Cup, and the Washington Senators won their first World Series championship. Clarence DeMar won the 28th Boston Marathon, Black Gold was the winning horse in the 50th Kentucky Derby, and Lew Pettijohn won the 12th Indianapolis 500.

Soldier Field, the home of the Chicago Bears NFL team, opened in 1924 as the Municipal Grant Park Stadium. In 1925, the name was changed to Soldier Field as a memorial to soldiers who died in combat.



In 1924, The Plastic Age was a best-selling fiction book, The Thief of Bagdad was a top-grossing film, and It Had to Be You was one of the most popular songs. George Gershwin's piano solo, Rhapsody in Blue, was first performed at the Aeolian Hall in New York City.

Harold Gray's comic strip, Little Orphan Annie, debuted in the New York Daily News, and ran for 86 more years until 2010

In 1924, the first Macy's Thanksgiving parade took place in New York City.

Consumer products that were launched during 1924 include the Bit-O-Honey candy bar, Butter Brickle, Dum Dums, iodized table salt, Kleenex facial tissues, locking pliers, Marlboro cigarettes, and Wheaties breakfast cereal.

One of 21,588

The American Association for State and Local History completed a census of history museums, historical societies and related organizations in 2022. Using a variety of sources, including the IRS, they arrived at the number 21,588. That is more than the number of public libraries (16,607), Starbucks (15,188), McDonald's (13,452) or Walmarts (4,668).

The AASLH discovered that:


 There is a historical organization in nearly every community around the country.



- Engagement with and access to history is imbued with a sense of public purpose. All sorts of organizations, from the largest to the smallest, place community and public benefit at the center of their work.
- Private non-profit historical organizations are overwhelmingly very, very small. More than 60% reported annual revenue of less than \$50.000.
- The majority of local historical societies are maintained with few funds and the energy of volunteers.

The Alden Historical Society is one of those 21,588 historical organizations. It was formerly organized April 21, 1965 with the help of Charles Neuman of the Marilla Historical Society and Julia Reinstein of the Cheektowaga Historical Society.

After meeting in various places around the village, the Society found a permanent home at 13213 Broadway when Walden Roberts purchased the Arthur Roberts home in November 1966, and donated it to the Town of Alden for use by the Society. The first meeting was held there the following February, with members advised to bring their own chairs!



The Society was granted a provisional charter by the New York Board of Regents in 1967. The absolute charter was granted in 1970.

Today, as the Alden Historical Society begins its 59th year, the Board of Trustees is reviewing its mission statement and discussing how to better serve the families of Alden. Your ideas for programs and displays are always welcome. Send them to aldenhistsoc@gmail.com.

Curator's Corner

A large family radio donated from the Gassman farm sits in the Hamlet room of the Heritage Center. Beginning with the dawn of electricity, many families purchased radios for their families. I recently read an article about what people did in the evening before radio, tv, and the internet. After the dinner chores were completed, the family would gather in the living room. People would play musical instruments and sing together, talk to one another, or read books. Games were played, neighbors would stop by to visit and children played with toys on the floor.

When radio arrived, (about 1920), there were serial shows like the Lone Ranger and variety shows to entertain the family. People depended on the radio for news also, as the newspapers were usually a day behind in their reporting. I personally listened to a



recording of the radio broadcast letting the world know about the attack on Pearl Harbor. News was not instantaneous as it is today. I believe that our children would be stunned to have to entertain themselves without computers and TV.

Interestingly, people also went to bed earlier especially in the winter. Nearly everyone rose at dawn or before.

The radio in our center serves as a reminder of days gone by when families actually talked to one another! ~Kris Rogers

October program - WNY National Cemetery Memorial Council

12 to learn more about the National Cemetery in
Pembroke and the Wreaths Across America
program. Marlene Roll, past Commander of
NYVFW and former Director of the Erie County
Veterans Service Agency, led the presentation by
providing the history of national cemeteries and

the process that led to the establishment of the WNY National Cemetery in Pembroke. Hailey Whitton, representing the Pembroke National Cemetery, brought along an application form for burial and recommended making arrangements ahead of need. Pam Ware of the Daughters of the American Revolution or DAR shared that the DAR is made up of volunteers who participate in ceremonies such as Veterans' Day, Memorial Day, Pearl Harbor Day, etc. The final presenter was Matt Moscato, a teacher at Pembroke High School where he has organized and leads a group of students called the Pembroke Veterans Outreach Club. ~Elli DeFilippo















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MISSION STATEMENT
